






Europe's largest single river protected area, which ...









Reduction of natural river dynamics

Length: - 25%

Width: - 75%

Gravel banks: - 90%

Steep banks: - 80%





Long-term Goal (TBR nomination form 2020)

1. Ecological Conservation and ecosystem services:

In the TBR MDD area, the natural processes of a dynamic river and the associated floodplains are preserved and/or restored, as well as the natural hydrological and natural hydromorphological regime and the corridor function of rivers. The ecological connectivity will be improved and maintained. As a result, there will be a positive influence on the conservation of key species and habitats on a long-term scale.


